

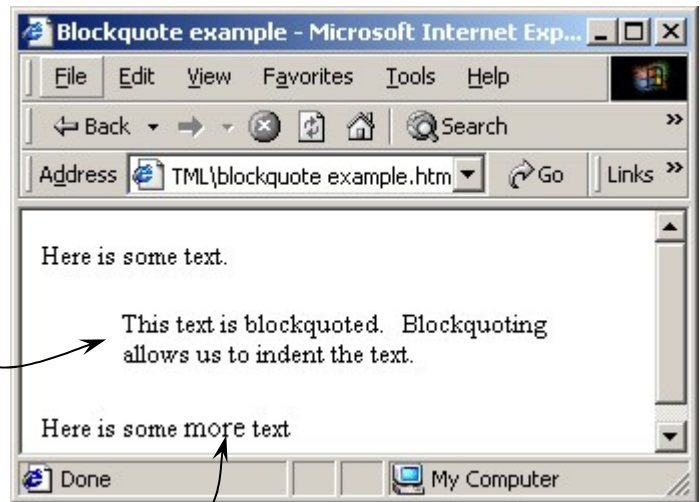
## Some more HTML tags to try

Beginning tag	End tag	Function (what they do)
<big>	</big>	Allows you to make one or more <b>WORDS</b> bigger than the rest within a piece of text.
<small>	</small>	Allows you to make one or more words smaller than the rest within a piece of text.
<blockquote>	</blockquote>	Mark a piece of text to be indented as a quote.
<font>	</font>	Marks a section of the text to be displayed in a different font. [The standard font for most browsers is Times New Roman]

### Blockquoting and big – example

```
<head>
<title>Blockquote example</title>
</head>

<body>
<p>Here is some text.</p>
<blockquote><p>This text is
blockquoted. &nbsp; Blockquoting
allows us to indent the text.
</p></blockquote>
<p>Here is some <big>more</big>
text</p>
</body>
```



Notice how this example also shows the use of &nbsp; to create a larger space after the full stop. This helps to make the paragraph easier to read.

### Font

Remember, last time, we looked at font styles? Well, most browsers will default to Times New Roman (this means they will use TNR if no other font is specified when the page is created). TNR is the font used in the example window above, it looks OK on paper, but doesn't work very well on some computers, especially if the user is looking at the Web page in a small window on a mobile phone!

Adding the line:

```
<font face=arial>
```

after the <body> tag will change our page to look like this:
