

Click here to email the Webmaster ...

It's often nice to be able to email the webmaster of a page.

This could be to compliment them on the style of their page, to ask for more details on something they have explained, or to be kind (and polite) and tell them when a link on their site no longer works.

Email links are anchor points. They work in the same way as anchor points to another page or another Web site – except that they link to an email address, and open a new email message to that address.

They take the format:

```
<a href="mailto: scooby.doo@scoobydoo.com">email Scooby</a>
```

So, instead of the URL for a page of site, you put mailto: and then the email address.

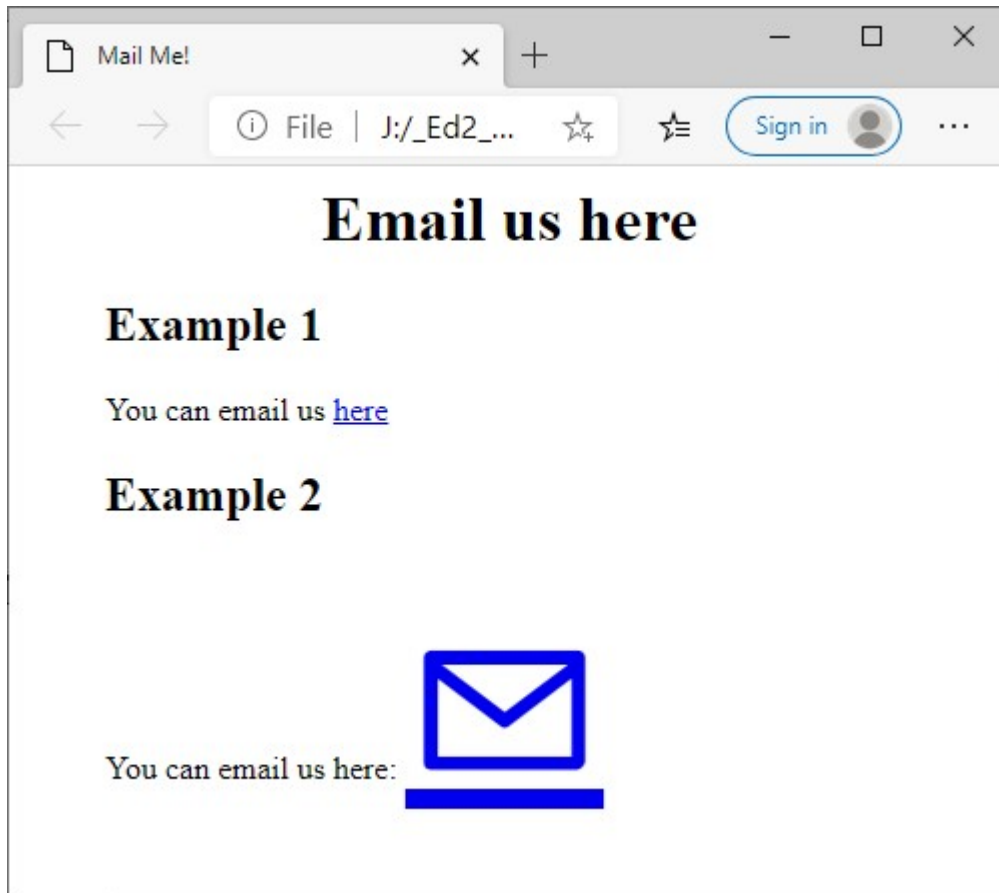
Here's a small page, with a couple of examples – either just using words, or using a special character to make it a bit more inviting:

It's the first of the two numbers by the emoji you need to use - and adjust the size to suit how big (or small) you want it.
